

12 Days Egypt and Israel

The 12-day Egypt and Israel tour is an incredible journey that takes you through some of the most mesmerizing lands in the world. On the first day, you arrive at Cairo International Airport, where you'll be greeted by a knowledgeable tour representative who will transport you to your hotel. Later, you will visit the Karnak Temple, the largest religious complex in the world, before transferring to Luxor International Airport for your flight to Sharm El Sheikh. The eighth day is a day of relaxation, where you can enjoy the beach, swim, snorkel, dive, or take part in a variety of other activities.

You will depart from Sharm El Sheikh and cross the border to Eilat, Israel. After the border formalities, you'll transfer to your hotel in Eilat, where you'll spend the night. On the tenth day, you'll embark on a tour of Jerusalem, where you'll visit the Western Wall, the Church of the Holy Sepulchre, and the bustling markets of the Old City. You'll also visit Bethlehem, the birthplace of Jesus Christ, and the Dead Sea, where you can float on the saltiest body of water in the world.

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
